Directions for Woodland Mound Park, 8250 Old Kellogg Road, : From I-271 South: After crossing into Kentucky, take I-275 E toward Anderson Township. Go 3.5 miles and take the exit to US-52 east. Go 3 miles and turn left on 8 Mile Road. Go 400 ' and turn R on Old Kellogg. Go .2 miles to reach the park (see map on the calendar page of our website, <u>www.friendshipforcecincinnati.org</u>). The Chipmunk Shelter will be on your left, across the street from the restrooms and the playground.

From Our President

"The only certainty is that nothing is certain." Pliny the Elder said that almost 2000 years ago, and his words are no less true today. Uncertainty makes planning difficult for everyone. We cannot predict when the coronavirus will be under control, when we will have a vaccine, when we will be able to travel or safely host people in our homes. Though nothing is certain, we can try to do the best we can under challenging circumstances.

We don't know what 2021 will bring, but thinking optimistically, we hope to host a group from Lower Columbia, Washington in October, 2021. (This is the same FF club that hosted many of us in September, 2019.) Connie Taggart is the Exchange Director for this journey. She'll be looking for hosts and volunteers for other jobs once this trip is definite. We hope to travel to Moscow and Kirov Oblast, Russia sometime in 2021 as well. Fingers crossed.

In the meantime, here's some good news. Friendship Force International has exceeded their fundraising goal of \$340,000. The total to date, including all international contributions, is \$486,000. So FFI has the means to keep going.

Rules for voting in Ohio:

- You can request an absentee ballot now. It can be returned by mail thru Nov 2 or returned in person by Nov. 3.—Don`t offer to turn in your neighbor`s ballot unless they are a close relative.
- Early voting will be Oct 6—Nov 2 at 4700 Smith Road. Check Country Board of Elections for times. You can also turn in an absentee ballot at this address.
- If you request an absentee ballot and then decide to vote in person, your vote will be provisional. Mail in your absentee ballot several weeks in advance of Nov. 3!!!
- Nov 3 polls open 6:30AM—7:30 PM. Bring unexpired OH drivers license, or Utility bill or bank statement with your name and address.

Rules for Kentucky:

- You can request an absentee ballot now thru Oct 9. Rules have changed so that concern for COVID-19 is a valid reason for voting absentee. Ballot must be received by Nov 6, so be sure to mail it several weeks before Nov 3. Drop boxes will be available. If you request an absentee ballot, you cannot vote in person.
- Early voting Oct 13-Nov 2. Check online to find locations and times.
- Nov 3: Polls open 6AM to 6PM. Bring a KY picture ID
